1. <u>Universalism</u> – no matter what you believe, i.e. Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, etc, you too will be in heaven because you are God's child. Because God is love and you are

4. <u>Distrust of Scripture</u> – because we are born as His children and most of the scripture talks about Jesus and that following him is the only way for salvation, we can then begin to pick apart scripture saying it was written by misogynistic men with an agenda to oppress people.

There is grave danger in believing that everyone who is created by God is indeed God's child. Scripture teaches that only those who are in Christ are adopted in Romans 8. Jesus himself in John 14 makes it clear that he is the only way for truth, life, and salvation. No one goes to the Father except through him.

Theology matters. Doctrine Matters. We believe in the great confession that Jesus is the Christ and the Son of the Living God and understanding that matters. Remember what Jesus himself said in Matthew 7:13-14, "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it."

Elder's Corner

I'm not sure if other elders have the same problem I do, in choosing a topic for an Elder's Corner. I always pray about what I should write, and God does let me know what He would like me to need to share. But...this month's offering sounds a bit self-serving since I am living what I want to write about.

This Elder's Corner is dedicated to those who are caregivers, have been care-givers, or will be care-givers. Every one of us will most likely fall into one of these categories at one time or another.

A commonly accepted definition of caregiver is a family member or paid helper who regularly looks after a child or a sick, elderly, or disabled person. According to the National Alliance of Caregiving, there are approximately 40 million Americans providing care for an adult family member or friend, yet few of these identify themselves as caregivers. Not included in that number are all those who care for infants and small and special-needs children.

Caregivers provide any or all of the following: preparing meals, doing housework, assisting with bathing/showering and dressing, help with getting in and out of bed, doing the shopping, organizing, and giving medications, monitoring medical conditions, providing transportation to medical and other appointments, and, maybe most importantly, advocating on behalf of the person cared for. There are most likely many other areas for which caregivers monitor/take care of/handle/check/supervise and organize. The list is long and varied.

Good caregivers possess the patience of Job, the compassion of Mother Teresa, the attentiveness of a mother with her first baby, the dependability of a trusted friend, and trustworthiness of a Swiss banker. Caregiving can be physically tiring, mentally challenging, emotionally draining, and spiritually exhausting. In other words, it can be a very, very demanding job.

It came as a bit of a surprise when I realized that I had taken on the caregiver role. It happened gradually over a period of years actually. My husband encountered several health issues that slowly impacted his ability to do things that he had done for himself for years. I believe that happens to many people who "fall into" becoming caregivers.

Personally, I consider myself blessed. I am able to care for a man I have loved for over 65 years. He can be grouchy, but he always apologizes when he realizes that he is being grouchy. I know that is not true in many cases. He also tries to do as much as he can for himself and tells me over and over how much he appreciates all I do for him. He tells everyone what a great wife I am and how lucky he is that I agreed to marry him all those years ago. I know this is not true in many cases. He is also of sound mind, even though he forgets things now and then--but, at our age, who doesn't. This is not true for those caring for people with cognitive difficulties. He doesn't wander so I don't worry when I leave him for several hours to go to work or engage in volunteer work. Again, this is not true for many caregivers.

Lest you think that I am a perfect wife and caregiver, let me put it to you this way. There are days that I am grouchy, and I have to apologize. There are days that I don't really want to hear what a great person and wife I am because I don't feel that I am. There are days that my husband reminds me that I don't do things the way he does--no kidding. There are days I am just plain tired but know I have to still get things done. In other words, there are days when I am just like every other caregiver who feels overwhelmed.

By now you may be wondering why God put this subject on my heart to share. So far, I have not quoted any Bible references. I have not mentioned prayer or meditation or any other "spiritual" aspect that is a usual part of an Elder's Corner.

So let me put on my Elder's hat. A few weeks ago, I heard a Bible verse, then read the same Bible verse in my nightly devotions and it stuck in my mind. In the Book of Matthew (Matt 20:28), Jesus tells his disciples that He did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.

I believe that caregivers understand and live the word "serve" better than most anyone because they live it every day--many days with little or no appreciation by those served or those not involved in caregiving. Sometimes not even understanding how much the people they care for need them.

As a member of a community of God's people, I hope you will take some time and seek out those who are caregivers and ask if you can provide some service for one of them. Something as easy as sending a card, making a phone call, sending an e-mail to let them know that what they do is important--something valuable. Remembering them in prayer is also very important.

Oh yes, a hug is always appreciated.

Donating Required IRA Distributions to the Endowment Fund

Recently a church member asked about assigning a portion of his annual required minimum distribution to our Endowment Fund.

Current IRS regulations require that after age 70¹/₂ you must take a portion of your Individual Retirement Account (IRA) out each year.

If the required distribution comes directly to you, it creates a taxable event. However, you can direct all or a portion of the annual distribution to a qualified 501-c organization such as First Christian Church of the Beaches.

Since these direct distributions are ordinary taxable income, it can push some retirees into a higher marginal tax bracket. This in turn could trigger a Medicare surtax and/or impact the taxation of your social security and Medicare Part B & D premiums.

If you are interested in learning more, it is suggested you check with your financial advisor or administrator who handles your required minimum distributions.

This month we have new books to add to our library. They can be found on the "New Additions" shelf, under the window. Some examples are:

The Parables of Jesus by William Barclay:

Each chapter analyzes an individual parable--identifies its theme, explains it in the light of the language and customs of the ancient world, and interprets its meaning for us today.

A Simplified Harmony of the Gospels by George Knight:

Features: • The four Gospels woven into a single, running narrative • All Scriptures taken from the Holman Christian Standard Bible • Sidebars call attention to major themes and difficult passages in the Gospels • Hundreds of study notes— a regular feature of every page—illuminate the text • Useful for both lesson and sermon preparation as well as stand-alone reading • Systematic reading plan for family worship and devotional use.

We also have two new books by C.S. Lewis: <u>*Miracles* and *Beloved Works of C.S. Lewis*</u>. The *Beloved Works* book includes his spiritual memoir <u>Surprised by Joy</u>.

The church library is currently underused, so we are considering the next steps for it. One option would be to limit the collection to books for biblical research and study. At that point, we might be able to build an electronic catalog of resource materials available through the church.
